### BIGHORN SHEEP LAMB ARRIVES

Tucson, AZ (March 24, 2016)—The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum is celebrating the arrival of a Bighorn lamb born at approximately 1:15 PM on March 23.

“This is the fourth lamb for this ewe and they are both doing great,” said Shawnee Riplog-Peterson, the Museum’s Curator of Mammalogy and Ornithology. “We are so pleased to have another successful birth as part of the Species Survival Program (SSP) for Bighorn Sheep organized by the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA).”

Visitors were able to watch the birth and see the ewe give her gentle “foot-stamp” to encourage the lamb to stand and take its first steps. The ram was seen in action too as he walked slowly passed the lamb to get his first look.

“Visitors will be surprised how quickly lambs begin romping over the steep terrain, so we encourage everyone to come soon to watch this lamb gain strength and climbing proficiency,” Riplog-Peterson added. “Bighorns are difficult to spot in the wild, so it’s always a delight for visitors to see newborns up close.”

The ewe that gave birth yesterday is the same ewe which delivered a female lamb just before Easter, 2015. This ewe was obtained in an exchange from the Los Angeles Zoo in early 2014 as part of the SSP’s efforts to expand the genetic diversity in captive populations. Yesterday’s event is the eighth successful lamb birth at the Museum.
